Item 9: Individual Planning Policy Released for Consultation

Consultation is now underway on the reviewed 2005 Ageing, Disability and Home Care (ADHC) Individual Planning Policy and Procedures. It has been released for consultation as the draft 2010 Lifestyle Planning Policy and Practice Guidelines. The consultation ends on 16 April 2010.

The 2005 Individual Planning Policy and Procedures (IP Policy) is a core client support policy for people with a disability. It provides the framework for many of ADHC's other policies and practice requirements in funded and operated accommodation support services, including those covering health care, risk management and behaviour support.

Regional focus groups

A series of Regional focus groups comprising ADHC frontline staff and management were held in July and August 2008, and were followed up in February and March 2009, to explore the difficulties staff were experiencing in implementing the IP Policy. The aim of this policy review was to:

- introduce a person centred approach to the way planning is done with individuals in ADHC operated and funded services, and how they are supported to develop and maintain skills and capacities, and a lifestyle that reflects their goals and is valued in the community
- simplify the procedural and documentation requirements of the policy
- embed policy implementation in the ADHC continuous quality improvement processes.

Changes

The format of the draft Lifestyle Planning Policy differs from the current policy in its layout and approach. An 'Introduction to a Consultation for the draft Lifestyle Planning Policy', has been prepared to explain the differences between the two policies and the benefits they provide. The proposed approach will be more meaningful if this document is read before the draft policy.

Feedback and comments

ADHC is seeking feedback and comments on the draft Policy before it is released for implementation in ADHC operated and funded non-government accommodation support services. Within the context of the Home Modifications, Carolyn will discuss a range of ethical dilemmas such as the inability to modify homes due to maintenance and structural issue problems; OH&S issues including using private dwellings as a work place and a safe home; financial abuse; and capacity and decision making – how do we advise and how do we ensure the best interests of the stakeholders are achieved?

The conference will also feature a panel discussion comprising some of the conference speakers. Please think about any questions or scenarios you might like to raise.

Item 12: Reforms to retirement villages laws

Important changes to the Retirement Villages Act and Regulation came into effect on 1 March 2010.

A retirement village is any residential complex predominantly occupied by retired persons who are aged over 55 years who have entered into some form of contractual arrangement with the owner or operator of the village. There are approximately 591 retirement villages across NSW, accommodating more than 36,000 residents.

Changes

The changes to the Act include:

- Annual management meetings between operators and residents.
- Annual safety inspections.
- A settling-in period for new residents.
- Reducing the recurrent charges payable by a former occupant after vacating.
- Encouraging operators to keep recurrent charge increases at or below the rate of inflation.
- Increasing operators' accountability for budget deficits.
- Ensuring urgent repairs are carried out quickly.
- Cutting red tape for smaller village operators.
- Improving the way residents committees operate and making it easier for more residents to be involved.
- Giving residents the right to make reasonable alterations to their dwelling.
- Better protection of refund entitlements for residents who do not have a registered interest in their dwelling.

NSW Fair Trading and the Land and Property Management Authority are also developing a register of all retirement villages in NSW. The register will enable Fair Trading to easily distribute important information about changes to the law or other matters to all villages.

Operators of existing villages must notify the Land and Property Management Authority that their land is being used as a retirement village by 1 June 2010. For new villages, notification must be given before entering into any village contracts with residents. Registration is a once-only process.

Village operators need to complete a request form available from the Land and Property Management Authority website (details above)

On the Request form, the operator only needs to identify the land (or the relevant part of the land) that is being used as a retirement village and the name of the retirement village.

Item 14: Red Tape reduction report

Outlining how the NSW Government will reduce red tape, the Department of Premier and Cabinet (DPC) report, NGO Red Tape Reduction was released by the Hon Linda Burney MP on 8 March 2010.

In this report, NGO is taken to cover Local Government to the extent that it provides services funded by the NSW Government.

The Report

The recommendations in this report will be jointly implemented by agencies that make up the Department of Human Services, particularly Ageing Disability and Home Care (ADHC), and Community Services, who together provide more than 80% of the State Government's total funding to the sector.

The State Plan commits the NSW Government to helping to build a more effective NGO sector by reducing unnecessary administrative red tape and building on existing NGO skills.

This report is one of a number of activities aimed at improving the capacity of the NGO sector to deliver on key NSW Government commitments to support some of the most vulnerable members of our community. These strategies will support improvements in the efficiency of the sector, including opportunities to reduce administrative overheads in the face of increasing cost pressures.

Completed review

The DPC has completed a review on opportunities that human service agencies can implement to reduce red tape. These opportunities have been tested and developed in consultation through the mechanism of the Working Together for NSW Agreement, with key peaks and a sample of direct service providers.

ADHC is coordinating this work across the Department of Human Services agencies and in consultation with NSW Health to put in place the short-term strategies which focus on aligning service acquisition and contract management by July 2010.

Further review

To achieve further red tape reductions, additional areas will be examined for opportunities for reform during 2010, including: implementing mutual recognition of other agencies monitoring activities; introducing more quantitative performance monitoring; considering a single consolidated financial audit to be shared between funding agencies; and developing a standard funding agreement for the Department.
